Charging and Remissions Policy

2025

Statement of intent

Ormesby Village Infant and Junior Schools Federation is committed to ensuring equal opportunities for all pupils, regardless of financial circumstances, and has established the following policy and procedures to ensure that no child is discriminated against by our offering of school trips, activities and educational extras.

In addition, we are committed to adhering to legal requirements regarding charging for school activities, and meeting all statutory guidance provided by the DfE.

We promise:

- Not to charge for education provided during school hours.
- To inform parents on low incomes and in receipt of relevant benefits of the support available to them when asking for contributions.

1. Legal framework

1.1. This policy will have consideration for, and be in compliance with, the following legislation and statutory guidance:

- Education Act 1996
- The Charges for Music Tuition (England) Regulations 2007
- The Education (Prescribed Public Examinations) (England) Regulations 2010
- DfE (2014) 'Charging for School Activities'
- DfE (2015) 'Governors' Handbook'

2. Charging for education

2.1. We will not charge parents for:

- Admission applications.
- Education provided during school hours.
- Education provided outside school hours if it is part of the national curriculum, part of a syllabus for a prescribed public examination that the pupil is being prepared for by the school, or part of religious education.
- Instrumental or vocal tuition, unless provided at the request of the pupil's parents.
- Entry for a prescribed public examination, if the pupil has been prepared for it at the school.
- Examination re-sits, if the pupil is being prepared for the re-sits at the school.

2.2. We may charge parents for the following:

- Materials, books, instruments or equipment, where they desire their child to own them
- Trips where the cost outweighs the support economically viable for the school, irrespective of whether the trip has an educational value.
- Optional extras
- Music and vocational tuition (in certain circumstances, see section 7)
- Use of community facilities

3. Early Years Funding

3.1 Government funding is intended to cover the cost to deliver 15 or 30 hours a week of free, high quality, flexible childcare only. It is not intended to cover the cost of meals, consumables, additional hours or additional services.

- Additional hours and services will be charged at the current hourly rate where hours are not funded as Early Education by the Local Authority.

Charges for additional services such as trips will be agreed in advance with families.

- The following charges apply when taking a free entitlement place –
- Cost of Meals and Snacks
The above charges are voluntary. Families are able to supply their own. It may be possible to reduce these costs, but matters must be discussed with the Headteacher.
- The free entitlements will be delivered consistently so that all children accessing any of the free entitlements will receive the same quality and access to provision, regardless of whether they opt to pay for optional hours, services, meals or consumables.

4. Optional extras

4.1. We may charge parents for the following optional extras:

- Education provided outside of school time that is not:
 - Part of the national curriculum.
 - Part of a syllabus for a prescribed public examination that the pupil is being prepared for at the school.
 - Religious education.
- Examination entry fees where the pupil has not been prepared for the examinations at the school
- Transport, other than that arranged by the LA for the pupil to be provided with education
- Board and lodging for a pupil on a residential visit
- Extended day services offered to pupils

4.2. When calculating the cost of optional extras, the school will only take into account the following:

- Materials, books, instruments or equipment provided in relation to the optional extra
- The cost of buildings and accommodation
- The employment of non-teaching staff
- The cost of teaching staff (including teaching assistants) under contracts for services purely to provide an optional extra
- The cost, or an appropriate proportion of the costs, for teaching staff employed to provide vocal tuition or tuition in playing a musical instrument

4.3. The school will not charge in excess of the actual cost of providing the optional extra divided by the number of participating pupils. We will not charge a subsidy for any pupils wishing to participate but whose parents are unwilling or unable to pay the full charge. If a proportion of the activity takes place during school hours, we will not charge for the cost of alternative provision for those not participating.

4.4. Participation in any optional activity will be on the basis of parental choice and a willingness to meet the charges. Therefore, parental agreement is a pre-requisite for the provision of an optional extra.

5. Examination fees

5.1. We may charge for examination fees if:

- The examination is on the prescribed list (which includes SATs, GCSEs and A levels), but the pupil was not prepared for it at the school.
- The examination is not on the prescribed list, but the school arranged for the pupil to take it.
- A pupil fails, without good reason, to complete the requirements of any public examination where the governing body or LA originally paid or agreed to pay the fee.

6. Examination re-sits

6.1. Where a pupil is entered for a second or subsequent attempt at an examination, we will pay the fee. Once pupils have left the school, re-sits must be taken at the school.

6.2. If a pupil or their parents consider it to be in the best interests of the pupil to request that an examination is re-marked, any fees involved must be covered by the pupil or their parents. If the awarding body changes the overall grade of the result, the school will not be charged by the awarding body and the parent/pupil will have their fees refunded.

7. Voluntary contributions

7.1. We may ask for voluntary contributions towards the benefit of the school or school activities. If an activity cannot be funded without voluntary contributions, we will make this clear to parents at the outset. We will also make it clear that there is no obligation for parents to make a contribution, and notify parents whether assistance is available.

7.2. No child will be excluded from an activity simply because their parents are unwilling or unable to pay. If a parent is unwilling or unable to pay, their child will still be given an equal opportunity to take part in the activity. If insufficient voluntary contributions are raised to fund an activity, and the school cannot fund it via another source, the activity will be cancelled.

7.3. We will strive to ensure that parents do not feel pressurised into making voluntary contributions.

8. Music tuition

8.1. Music tuition is the only exception to the rule that all education provided during school hours must be free. The Charges for Music Tuition (England) Regulations 2007 allow for charges to be made for vocal or instrumental tuition provided either individually or to groups of any size – provided that the tuition is at the request of the pupil's parents.

8.2. The charges will not exceed the cost of the provision, including the cost of the staff providing the tuition.

9. Transport

9.1. We will not charge for:

- Transporting registered pupils to or from the school premises, where the LA has a statutory obligation to provide the transport.
- Transporting registered pupils to other premises where the governing body or LA has arranged for pupils to be educated.
- Transporting pupils to meet an examination requirement when they have been prepared for the examination at the school.
- Transport provided for an educational visit, although a voluntary contribution may be requested.

10. Residential visits

10.1. We will not charge for:

- Education provided on any visit that takes place during school hours.
- Education provided on any visit that takes place outside school hours if it is part of the national curriculum, part of a syllabus for a prescribed public examination that the pupil is being prepared for at the school, or part of religious education.
- Supply teachers to cover for teachers accompanying pupils on visits.

10.2. We may charge for board and lodging – but the charge will not exceed the actual cost.

10.3. Parents will be exempt from board and lodging costs if they can prove that they are in receipt of one or more of the following benefits:

- Universal Credit
- Income Support
- Income Based Jobseekers Allowance
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Child Tax Credit, provided that Working Tax Credit is not also received and the family's income (as assessed by Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs) did not exceed £16,190 in the previous financial year
- The guarantee element of State Pension Credit
- An income related employment and support allowance

11. Education partly during school hours

- 11.1. If 50 percent or more of the time spent on an activity occurs during school hours (including time spent travelling if the travel occurs during school hours), it is deemed to take place during school hours and no charge will be made.
- 11.2. If less than 50 percent of the time spent on an activity occurs during school hours, it is deemed to have taken place outside school hours and we may charge for the activity; however, we will not charge if the activity is part of the national curriculum, part of a syllabus for a prescribed public examination that the pupil is being prepared for at the school, or part of religious education.
- 11.3. **Residential visits:** If the number of school sessions covered by the visit is equal to or greater than 50 percent of the number of half days (any period of 12 hours ending with noon or midnight on any day) spent on the visit, we will not charge for the activity.
- 11.4. The remission of charges for board and lodging payments is the responsibility of the school. These costs will be borne by our contingency funds.

12. Damaged or lost items

- 12.1. The school may charge parents for the cost of replacing items broken, damaged or lost due to their child's behaviour. Parents will not be taken to court for failure to pay such costs.

13. Remissions

- 13.1. We have set aside a small fund to enable families in financial difficulty to send their children on visits/activities. The funding is limited and there is no guarantee that all requests can be met. Assistance will be allocated on a needs basis, and if the full cost of the trip/activity cannot be met through assistance funding and voluntary contributions, the trip/activity will be cancelled.
- 13.2. Parents in receipt of any of the following benefits may request assistance with the costs of activities:
- Universal Credit
 - Income Support
 - Income Based Jobseekers Allowance
 - Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
 - Child Tax Credit, provided that Working Tax Credit is not also received and the family's income (as assessed by Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs) did not exceed £16,190 in the previous financial year
 - The guarantee element of State Pension Credit
 - An income related employment and support allowance

13.3. To request assistance, parents should contact the school office or one of the Pastoral Support Workers.

14. Refunds

14.1. The school will refund any excess income to parents up to the value of £100. Any amount greater than this will need approval from the Finance Governors/Chair. Refunds may be required for elements, such as: trips, Nursery fees, school dinners, childcare (breakfast/after-school) and/or clubs.

14.2. Refunds for trips that the school have paid a significant outlay for based on accurate pupil numbers will be at the discretion of the Finance Governors, particularly if the decision not to attend the trip has been made within seven days of the departure date. The Finance Governors will deliberate over the reason for not attending the trip and determine whether these are exceptional circumstances. The Finance Governors will determine whether a refund should be awarded.

15. Letting/Hiring of Non-Sports Facilities

15.1 The school will charge other schools or external groups for the use of the immersive learning classroom and its digital equipment. These will be predominantly casual bookings arranged with the school.

15.2 Any letting or hiring will be arranged directly with the hirer establishing a clear date for its use and this date will be visible on our immersive calendar.

15.3 With any booking, hirers will receive a hire agreement stating the conditions of the hire and who is responsible for the management and administration of the hire. All hirers must sign and return this agreement prior to any hire being undertaken.

15.4 Any hiring or letting will incur a charge of £50.00 per hour per class. If any additional or bespoke content is required to be built, this will also incur an additional charge of £50.00 per content. All Local Authority schools will be exempt from VAT, but Academy schools will be charged VAT at the standard rate.

15.5 All payments will be reconciled using BACS. Invoices will be sent to the hirer once the hire has been completed.

15.6 Any loss, damage or theft of the equipment or to the space will be subject to the conditions of hire and will incur charges to the hirer to the value of the replacement or repair.

This policy was written in November 2025 and taken to Governors.

This policy will be reviewed in November 2026 unless government legislation requires an earlier update.
